Low risk – a minor injury e.g. scratch or bruise

Medium risk – significant loss/damage or injury such as broken bones (requires hospital trip)

High risk – extensive loss, multiple injuries or death

Handling Bowsaw	Adults/ children	Cuts, lacerations, and abrasions	High	FSL - Tool talk and safe working distance 1.5m Ratio - adult to child 1:1 Qualified First aider and fully stocked first aid kit. Don't touch the blade always hold the handle. Wear a glove on non-tool hand	Medium	and others risks and to make safer choices. Learners will have the opportunity to select,
Carrying Bowsaw	Adults/ children	Slip, trips and falls Cuts, lacerations, and abrasions	High	FSL - Tool talk and safe working distance 1.5m One hand holding the back of the Bowsaw and down by your side. Blade cover must be on. No running while carrying the Bowsaw.	Medium	collect and return their own tool in the correct way. This will give them a deeper sense of ownership over their activity and the safety and risks.

Passing Bowsaw	Adults/ children	Cuts, lacerations, and abrasions	High	FSL - Tool talk and safe working distance 1.5m Passing Bowsaw with one hand on the back and turned so the handle is facing the learner/FSL and blade pointing down.	Medium	Learners will be aware of their surroundings giving them the responsibility of
Cleaning and Storing Bowsaw	FSL	Cuts, lacerations, abrasions and bruises	High	FSL to collect Bowsaw Clean and place it into a secure tool bag. Store bag into a secure shed/container. Cleaning: Hold Bowsaw away from body Brush blade (Small brush e.g. tooth brush) Spray with WD40 along the blade	Medium	maintaining and preserving their Forest School area. Learners will develop their gross motor skills.
